BRITISH MUSEUM TRIPS

YEAR 5: We visited the British Museum last week to explore the Anglo-Saxon and Viking galleries. As part of our history lessons, we researched and learned about the amazing discovery made in Sutton Hoo. Sutton Hoo, Suffolk, is home to one of the greatest archaeological discoveries of all time! We found out that it was an ancient Anglo-Saxon burial ground with a 27meter-long ship including a burial chamber located in the centre of the ship. Although the ship was no longer intact, the archaeologists were amazed by what they had found as it showed what life was like during the Anglo-Saxon times. We loved seeing all the artefacts that were found on the ship. We couldn't believe the items we were learning about was right in front of us!

We became investigators and completed various tasks to find out more about the burial at Sutton Hoo. The most exciting was viewing the famous helmet that clearly belonged to someone important!

YEAR 4: We visited the British Museum to see the artefacts from the Ancient Egyptian galleries. The children have been learning about the mummification process and were fascinated to see real

mummies! They also saw the Rosetta stone and saw hieroglyphics on many different artefact.
